CHAIRPERSON'S AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT 2017

We are pleased to present the 29th annual report of the Otago Community Trust for the year ended 31 March 2017.

Our History

Our origins lie in the Dunedin Savings Bank, established in 1864 by public spirited citizens of Otago who ensured a proportion of the Bank's profits were returned to the community. In 1988 the Government gave ownership of the Savings Bank to the Community Trust.

The Trust eventually sold its shares to Trust Bank New Zealand, which was then on sold to Westpac. Proceeds from the sale of Trust Bank New Zealand shares in the mid-1990s amounted to \$131m and the investment of these sale proceeds funds our donations to this day. Today our investment portfolio stands at \$280m.

Our Year

The Trust has experienced a positive year, with the Investment Portfolio returning 9.2% against a benchmark return of 7.3%. As a result, the total Trust Investment Portfolio at the end of the year rose to \$279.5m. The Trust's investment goals are to return as much as possible to the Otago Community through donations, as well as preserving the real value of the initial capital of the Fund. This is achieved through careful investment activity.

Russell Investment Group Ltd continues to be the Trust's Investment advisor and this year the Trust moved to an implemented consulting arrangement with Russell. This means that the Trustees have delegated responsibility for matters such as Fund Manager selection to Russell Investments, so that they can focus their attention on dealing with more strategic matters such as asset allocation.

Our Donations for 2016 - 2017

In the 12 months to 31 March 2017, the Trust approved donations totalling \$7.5m. Since our establishment in 1988 the Otago Community Trust has donated more than \$158m across the Otago region. Details of how our donations over the year have been distributed are set out in the following pages of this report. Outside of our regular donations, the Trust was pleased to have made a number of significant donations to community groups right across Otago, namely:

During the year the Trust introduced a new Strategic Plan which sets out the direction for the Trust over the next five years. Our plan has been developed to guide the Trust into the future, as we endeavour to work together with our communities and key stakeholders. Part of this work involves a review of the Trust's funding framework, or in other words the way we fund organisations. Whilst continuing to provide balanced support for a diverse range of community projects, we are committed to growing our knowledge and understanding of community needs ensuring that we are becoming a more strategic grant maker for Otago.

Over the next five years we will be advancing changes and a new approach to our grant making. This will build on past success while integrating necessary change to ensure we are incorporating international best practice.

Our Team

The Trust is governed by a dedicated board of 10 Trustees. During the year we farewelled Trustee Mrs Susie Johnston, and we thank her for her contribution during her involvement with the Trust. Recently the Associate Minister of Finance Hon Amy Adams has confirmed that the remaining 10 Trustees will continue in their roles for a further year before any changes are made.

Our trustees and staff are proud to have been involved with and helped contribute to a range of very worthwhile projects this year. We are always in awe of the enormous contribution made to the community by so many volunteers Otago-wide, and we take this opportunity to acknowledge the tremendous contribution you – the people of Otago make. We look forward to working together with all our communities over the next 12 months and continuing our support towards the great work you do.

KAITANGATA COMMUNITY CENTRE

The Kaitangata Community Centre Charitable Trust continue to work hard to realise their vision of creating a new community hall for the township. Kaitangata Community Hall chairman Evan Dick said the committee had been planning a new community hall for the town for over seven years and their hard work was paying off.

The group have worked hard fundraising for the project, raising over \$90,000 on their own with help from community events such as the Kaitangata Car Show and Run, Kaitangata Black Gold Bush Bash Motorbike Trail Ride as well as efforts from local band Crescent.

Otago Community Trust was pleased to support the group with their project in November 2016 with a \$120,000 donation. "We look forward to the community hall advancement and know that it will be a great community asset", said Otago Community Trust chief executive Barbara Bridger.

The group also received funding from the Lottery Grants Board, A J and M C Begg Charitable Trust, Alexander McMillan Trust and the Clutha District Council and are well supported by several other businesses and entities.

We are proud to support organisations that make a meaningful difference to the health and wellbeing of Otago people. Each year we donate over \$400,000 to Otago social service agencies.

CATLINS LAKE

The Catlins community and visitors to the beautiful South Otago area are set to benefit by having an improved outdoor recreational and educational amenity at Catlins Lake, thanks to the hard-working volunteers behind the Catlins Promotions community group.

Otago Community Trust was pleased to approve a donation of \$3,200 to Catlins Promotions in February this year to support the project.

Fergus Sutherland secretary for Catlins Promotions explains that the project involves clearing and replanting an amenity area at Catlins Lake and creating a walking track to a lake viewing area. "We have a bit of work to do removing unsightly non-native growth and potentially hazardous trees but once this is completed, we will replant with appropriate native trees and shrubs and create a walking track to a viewpoint where birdlife may be safely observed", he said.

The Catlins Lake is accessible from the Southern Scenic Route a few kilometres south of the town of Owaka and we are confident that this development will enhance its popularity and become a valuable visitor asset to the community.







A \$20,000 donation from the Otago Community Trust in July 2016 assisted the Milton Community Health Trust with a building renovation project to upgrade the Tokomairiro Community Hub in Milton.

Dale Wyber explains that the Hub was born out of a need to attract health and social support agencies to the area to enable more people to source help locally. The Tokomairiro Community Hub, opposite Suzie's Butchery on the main street of Milton, started with two service providers and is now able to offer 14 part-time and several casual service providers, a Hub Coordinator 3 days per week and also a Community Development worker 32 hours per week.

The renovation project involved the redevelopment of the building with the aim of future proofing the Hub to ensure it is a user friendly, warm and welcoming space. The Otago Community Trust has assisted significantly with Stage one of the redevelopment and the Hub team are very appreciative of the grant.

Otago Community Trust congratulates the Milton Community Health Trust on all the great work they are doing in the Milton/Bruce area supporting individuals and families.

KAKA POINT SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB

A \$4,500 donation from the Otago Community Trust helped the Kaka Point Surf Life Saving Club purchase a new twinhull surf canoe and paddles in early 2017.

"The surf canoe is a pivotal piece of equipment for the surf lifesaving club and this new purchase has created a huge interest with the younger members of the club", explains Nyree Dickie, Club Spokesperson.

It was only weeks after the canoe's arrival that club members put it to the test, attending the 2017 New Zealand Surf Life Saving Championships at New Brighton with the girl's teams making it through to the finals. A young boy's team also competed for the first time. Having only come to together 12 weeks prior to the meet the team did well to be placed midrange in the competition.

Both teams are committed to travel to Nationals next year in Gisborne and we look forward to more solid performances from Kaka Point Surf Life Saving Club in 2018.

PEST FREE PENINSULA

A \$30,000 donation from the Otago Community Trust assisted the Otago Peninsula Biodiversity Trust with its continued possum eradication programme on the Otago Peninsula. The Otago Peninsula Biodiversity Group (OPBG) possum control program started in March 2011 to help protect and enhance the Otago Peninsula's biodiversity. The group is rapidly approaching a total of 11,000 possums removed from the Otago Peninsula – an outstanding achievement!

What is magnificent about the OPBG work is that it would not be possible without the help of a small army of volunteers. Sarah Irvine explains that there are in the order of 60 volunteers at any one time undertaking monitoring (bird, rodents, lizards, vegetation), administration, publicity, possum detection, track clearing and trapping. "We are extremely fortunate to have such a dedicated group of volunteers, residents, and funders who help us work towards our vision: "A Pest Free Peninsula By 2050".



NEW SIGNAGE FOR HAWKSBURY LAGOON

Hawksbury Lagoon is situated near the East Otago town of Waikouaiti on the northern boundary of Dunedin City. The lagoon is a designated Wildlife Refuge under the Reserves Act 1977 and is considered a significant and increasingly rare example of an estuarine wetland.

With funding support from the Otago Community Trust the lagoon is set to have five new interpretation panels erected in the coming months. Shirley McKewen chairperson of Hawksbury Lagoon Inc explains that residents wanted to educate the wider public more about the importance of the lagoon, its wildlife, the plantings, and the significant Maori cultural history it represents.

"Signs will be placed at each entrance, on the Maori easement and near the bridge at the causeway intersection. We encourage local residents, visitors and special interest groups to come and learn more about this area of significance", she said.

THE STORY OF MOTOITOL

Otago Community Trust was pleased to continue its support to the Pūrākaunui Block Inc documentary film production in 2017. "Motoitoi" is a documentary film production exploring the untold story of Motoitoi, the highborn daughter of a prominent Māori Chief.

The film re-examines the collective history of Southern Māori, as perceived and experienced by the living descendants of Motoitoi's three daughters. Will Taylor, spokesperson from the Pūrākaunui Block Inc explains that "the first two weeks in April saw an enormous amount of activity in and around Pūrākaunui, Whareakeake, Long Beach (Wharauwerawera), and Dunedin, as we filmed our documentary on location in beautiful coastal Otago".

"A real highlight of the filming was the field trip with the Pūrākaunui School. Joining forces with archeologist, Brian

Allingham, allowed the kids to gain a clear understanding of the archeological significance of Pūrākaunui," he said

Motoitoi has been four years in the making and all production phases for this project are now complete. It is anticipated the film release will be in June 2018. You can learn more about Motoitoi at www.motoitoi.com



DUNEDIN PRISON

A \$20,000 donation from the Otago Community Trust assisted the Dunedin Prison Charitable Trust to complete repair and restoration works on the north Annex at the historic former prison in 2017.

The work involved roof replacement, carving and installation of three stone finials to the category 1 Heritage New Zealand building, which is located in one of the most important heritage precincts in New Zealand alongside the Railway Station, Law Courts and Toitu Settlers Museum.

Otago Community Trust chief executive Barbara Bridger commented that the Otago Community Trust has contributed over \$100,000 to the restoration of the Dunedin Prison over the last three years.

"We can see the real value in maintaining this majestic architecture, Dunedin prison is one of the city's iconic buildings and its restoration will complement the growing interest in, and appreciation of, Dunedin as a heritage city." she said.


NEW INTERACTIVE SCIENCE CENTRE FOR OTAGO
