

Chairperson's Annual Report

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I am pleased to present the Annual Report on the activities of the Trust for the year ended 31 March 2006.

The Trust Fund


The original capital was derived from the sale of shares in Trust Bank New Zealand in the mid 1990's. The sale of shares at that time yielded \$131 million and that amount has been inflation adjusted in order to preserve its real value.

At balance date the position of the Fund was as follows:

The donations budget for the year was set at \$5.5 million and was fully utilised. Due to the fact that the reserves are in a healthy state the trustees have set the donations budget for 2006-2007 at \$6 million.

Financial Performance

The investments of the Trust returned 14.4% or about \$24 million for the year which is a very pleasing result. Global shares returned 35% and New Zealand shares 22%. This return practically doubled the return of the previous year and is significantly higher than one would expect to earn for the mix of investments which the Trust currently holds. However, world markets remain volatile and while the current year has been particularly successful there is always the possibility of a reversal of fortunes in the future.

During the final quarter of the year the Trust decided to diversify 10% of its holdings into alternative assets. An amount of 5% was allocated to Collateralised Commodities Futures and of 5% was allocated to Fund of Hedge Funds. Alternative assets such as these tend to produce returns which are uncorrelated to our more traditional asset classes, thereby reducing the risk profile of the total portfolio. These investments were

made from funds withdrawn from New Zealand bonds.

The Trust utilises the services of five managers for its six assets classes including AMP for New Zealand cash and bonds and Tower for New Zealand shares and global bonds. The remaining global investments are managed by overseas companies. The Trust continues to engage the international firm Russell Investment Group as its investment advisor.

Outlook

As previously indicated it is practically impossible to accurately predict returns in future years. Over the long term our current investments are assumed to return 7–8% per annum. However, the volatility of our portfolio is such that a return anywhere between 2% and 13% could be expected. Statistically, there is one chance in 14 of a negative return.

Donations

Trustees approved donations of \$5,545,000 during the year. These donations were distributed throughout the Otago region and across all sectors of activity including education, community welfare, recreation, heritage and the arts. Major recipients included the Cromwell Community Board \$500,000 for the extensions to the town's swimming centre, \$200,000 towards the fitout of the Clyde Hospital, \$150,000 to further develop the Otago Central Rail Trail. \$125,000 for the new curling rink at Ice Sports Dunedin and \$120,000 for the Performing Arts Centre at Kings High School. In addition, under the Trust's assistance for sports development and participation as part of more healthy active lifestyles, \$667,000 was distributed to 21 regional sporting associations including \$146,000 to Sport Otago. Some 400 organisations received a donation during the year.

In addition to responding to unsolicited applications trustees continue to look across the

community for opportunities where Trust funding will make a positive difference. The Trust believes that it has a role to play in community development and, in collaboration with others, is exploring opportunities to fulfil that role.

Trustee Appointments

Trustees are appointed or reappointed by the Minister of Finance for a term of four years. It is generally permissible to serve two terms and in some instances a trustee may be appointed for a third term. It is pleasing to report that in May 2005 two of our current trustees, Mr Russell Hendry of Dunedin and Mrs Sally Hope of Oamaru were reappointed during the year for a second term of office. A third appointment was made to fill a vacancy created when a trustee resigned two years ago. Mrs Nicola Taylor, of Dunedin was appointed during the year and brings to the Trust her considerable experience in the areas of social services and community support.

Last month the 2006 appointments round was announced and it is pleasing to report that current trustees, Mr Bill Thomson of Balclutha and Mrs Raewynne Pedofski of Dunedin were re-appointed. Mr Alan McLay of Oamaru retired after serving as a trustee for eight years. Alan made a very significant contribution to the work of the Trust through his extensive knowledge of the North Otago community. His practical and innovative approach to community issues added much to the quality of the Trust's decision making. Trustees acknowledge with gratitude his service to the Trust. Mr Stuart Walker of Dunedin is welcomed as a new trustee appointment.

Trustees and Staff

All trustees have made a valuable contribution to the operation of the Trust and the interests and concerns of the entire Otago community are well represented by the diligent

and hard working representatives from the city of Dunedin and the provincial districts.

I am indebted to Hilary Allison for acting as deputy chair whenever called upon to do so.

Her assistance and co-operation are sincerely appreciated.

The Trust is very well served by its chief executive Keith Ellwood, donations manager Carol Melville and support staff Fay Jackson and Megan Jackson. On behalf of all the trustees I wish to thank Keith and his team for their effective and dedicated service to the Trust.

THE ARTS ON SHOW >

Bringing the arts to the people is a key driver in the Community Trust of Otago's support for arts festivals in Otago.

The 'light bulb idea' for a biennial Otago Festival of the Arts - now a major cultural event - was floated by the Trust in the late 1990s, says festival director, Nicholas McBryde.

"The Trust provided the seeding funding for a feasibility study. It continues as the festival's principal partner and its contribution is integral to the festival's ongoing success."

The Otago Festival of the Arts this year runs from 6-14 October, showcasing 100 regional, national and international performers. The Trust has given \$175,000 towards festival administration and artists' costs.

"Without the Community Trust of Otago, there would not be a festival," says Mr McBryde.

Staged prior to the Otago Festival of the Arts is the Dunedin Fringe Festival, which also receives Trust backing.

The largest festival of its kind in the South Island, the fringe festival presents innovative and experimental performances from local, national and international artists.

"For many of our artists, it is a first-time opportunity to show their talents before a larger audience," says Dunedin Fringe Festival director, Paul Smith.

"The Community Trust of Otago is our largest funder and their donation for promotion and publicity enables us to connect with a wider audience.'

SCHOLARSHIP STUDENTS GET RESULTS >

Otago scholarship students gained a flying start in 2005 thanks to funding from the **Community Trust** of Otago.

The Trust supported the Otago Secondary Schools Principals' Association's scholarship programme, which provided one hour a week of extra subject tuition for scholarship students beyond their usual schooling.

One such student is former dux of St Hilda's Collegiate, Naomi White, who achieved an outstanding pass in scholarship chemistry. She is now studying for a Bachelor of Science at Otago University.

"The programme was really helpful as it provided us with the opportunity to work on more difficult problems, compared with those we did in our Level 3 NCEA classes. It was also great to be able to access a top teacher in our subject area."

Of the 126 Dunedin students who took part in the programme in 2005, 85 gained a scholarship, a 40% increase compared with 2004. In rural Otago, 74 students received extra tuition with 29 gaining scholarships, a 93% increase. These rural students accessed tuition via OtagoNet, which also received Trust funding.

Otago Secondary Schools Principals' Association secretary, Gordon Wilson, says the programme's success is due to the Trust's willingness to support it and to the secondary schools' successful coordination of resources.

The Trust is also supporting the programme in 2006.

Twenty-five Otago sports benefited from the Trust's Regional Sports Fund in 2005, ensuring that sport development in Otago remains in good heart.

A total of \$667,000 was distributed to support regional sport development programmes.

"The Community Trust of Otago's continued funding for the development of Otago sport is significant and extremely valuable to our regional sport organisations, allowing them to continue to provide a range of coaching and support services," says Sport Otago CEO, Paul Allison.

The sport development programmes encourage participation in sport and offer pathways to improvement at all levels, and enable sport codes to provide robust administration support. coaches and crews."

One of the sports to benefit in 2005 was rowing, and Otago/Southland Regional Rowing Manager, Dean Horo, says the \$25,000 donation makes a huge difference to the support the region's rowers get.

DIGGING UP THE PAST AT LAWRENCE >

Over the past year around 20 Otago postgraduate anthropology students have delved into the rich social and spatial history of the historic Lawrence Chinese camp.

They've taken part in three archaeological digs at the site of the town (which had its heyday in 1891), unearthing materials such as nails, celedon ware, pottery, coins, metal tools and textiles to piece together the social structure and lives of the people who lived there.

The archaeological digs - directed by the University of Otago's Anthropology Department in partnership with the Historic Places Trust - have been funded by the Community Trust of Otago via the Lawrence Chinese Camp Charitable Trust, which plans to develop a Chinese neritage interpretation centre and to reconstruct a replica village at the site. Today, only a grassed paddock, fruit trees and parts of the Chinese Empire Hotel and its stable, remain.

While the digs have fulfilled the Chinese Charitable Trust's legal requirement for a conservation plan and site interpretation before reconstruction begins, they've also created a huge learning opportunity, say dig supervisors, Associate Professor Richard Walter and Chris Jacomb.

"From our viewpoint, the project has provided local opportunities for practical student training in archaeological digging, coding and drawing methods. From a heritage perspective, the site is internationally unique, representing an intact Chinese town."

Located on the outskirts of Lawrence, the town's position at the gateway to the Central Otago goldfields makes it one of New Zealand's most important and varied early Chinese settlements.



A TRAIL FOR EVERYONE >

Better surfaces, new shelter huts and new facilities mean the Otago Central Rail Trail is becoming increasingly accessible for everyone.

"When the trail was first being developed during the mid-1990s, it was used mostly by experienced pioneering cyclists. Today all sorts of people use it, including schools, recreational cyclists and tourists on multi-day adventures. Often they are less experienced and require better standards," says Owen Graham, the Otago Central Rail Trail Trust's executive officer.

This year's \$150,000 donation from the Trust has been used to construct 12 shelter huts, purchase an environmentally-friendly toilet to cater for people with disabilities, and for trail resurfacing work.

As part of an enabling project, the sixkilometre section from Hyde to Tiroiti and the 11-kilometre Poolburn Gorge section are being investigated for use by people with disabilities who are suitably equipped, Mr Graham says.

Accommodation bookings by rail trailers have sky-rocketed over the past three summers, with an estimated 6,500 visitors undertaking three to five-day journeys end-to-end and an estimated 80,000 day and casual users annually.

Community Trust funding, which has been ongoing since the trail was first being developed, has played

a vital role in getting the trail to the level where it's now managed as a sustainable community asset. Mr Graham says.

In particular a \$100,000 donation in 1995 funded the upgrade of the Poolburn Viaduct and the Manuherikia No 1 Bridge. The work opened up the Poolburn Gorge section of the trail, described as the trail's `jewel in the crown', he says.

Basis of Preparation

The Community Trust of Otago was incorporated as a Charitable Trust in accordance with the provisions of the Community Trusts Act 1999.

These are the summary consolidated financial statements of The Community Trust of Otago and its wholly owned subsidiaries, The Community Trust Amateur Sports Co Ltd, The Community Trust District Improvement Co Ltd and Fillmor House Limited.

The consolidated financial statements upon which these Summary Financial Statements are based, have been prepared to comply with the Financial Reporting Act 1993.

The Financial Statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost, except for the revaluation of Managed Funds.

Specific Accounting Policies

All specific accounting policies have been applied on the same bases as those used in the full consolidated financial statements of the Trust.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the year.

THE TRUST'S ORIGINS >

The Community
Trust of Otago's
origins date back
to 1863 when the
Dunedin Savings
Bank opened in
Princes Street.

The Bank's goal was to encourage thrift among Otago citizens and to distribute surpluses in a way that benefited the community. Over the next 135 years, the bank fulfilled its mission, and in later years became known as Trust Bank Otago.

In the banking industry restructuring of 1988, the Trust Bank Otago Community Trust was established to own and manage Trust Bank Otago shares on behalf of the people of Otago. Dividends from Trust Bank profits funded donations, thus continuing the philosophy and culture of the bank's founders.

In 1990, Trust Bank Otago merged with other regional trust banks to create Trust Bank New Zealand, which operated as a mainstream bank competing with major overseasowned banks. Prudential concerns eventually led to the sale of Trust Bank New Zealand to Westpac in 1996.

Otago's \$131 million share of the sale proceeds is the fund that today's Community Trust trustees are responsible for preserving and using for the benefit of Otago communities. The income generated pays for donations the Trust makes. Since 1988, the Trust has paid out over \$80 million in donations, with its original \$131 million in capital expanding to \$189 million.
